NORTH PLAINFIELD — Cara Benevenia, 15, of New Providence took the Best in Show prize Sunday at Project Fabricland, a design and sewing competition based on the TV show "Project Runway" and sponsored by the borough-based business Fabricland.

Casanova, a cast member and designer from Season 8 of the show, made an appearance and handed out prizes to all 26 competitors.

Benevenia's award-winning black semiformal dress in velvet and satin was accented with a Chantilly lace sleeve and trimmed with rows of black feathers. For the competition challenge, all the students were asked to create a design inspired by music. Benevenia chose the song "Welcome to the Jungle" by Guns N' Roses. Using a McCall pattern, she integrated the different fabrics and textures to create a whimsical yet elegant style, according to the competition judges.
